Aliya Logun: Portraiture of Black Youth -A Time Capsule of Infinite Possibilities October 25, 2024-January 19, 2025

The Africa Centre has envisioned this exhibition as a time capsule representing the infinite nature of youth self-expression. In a world of countless possibilities, people on the margins often find themselves boxed into limiting stereotypes. Through Black portraiture by the artist Aliya Logun, this exhibition asks, "Can blackness, Black bodies, and Black identity really be defined?"

This exhibition is a message for the future. If, 100 years from now, historians ask what Black youth were like at this moment, from this exhibition they would see that we were everything and anything.

A Look Within: The Vision of Alberta Collectors November 23, 2024-February 17, 2025

The long history of the AGA – as with all public galleries and museums – is interconnected with the lives and histories of individuals who love and collect art. As part of the AGA's 100th anniversary celebrations, this exhibition brings together more than 75 works of art on loan from private art collections from across Alberta.

Featuring a selection of works as varied as the collecting visions as the people who have lent them, *A Look Within* provides a view into the wide range of approaches, passions and interests that drive practices of collecting art. The exhibition is wide ranging, with works of historical Canadian art presented in dialogue with works from the 1960s to1990s, as well as works from the present day.

We are very grateful to the many lenders who agreed to share their works of art with the AGA and our audiences. Collecting is a labour of love and Alberta's deep love for art is reflected here.

Here to Tell: Faces of Holocaust Survivors November 28, 2024-February 9, 2025

We will soon be in a world without survivors of the Holocaust. Despite everything, they did not let their tormentors define them. *Here to Tell* provides a glimpse into the magnitude of the lived experiences of Shoah survivors who live(d) in Alberta. Remarkably, most of these survivors never failed to deliver a message of love and hope.

The exhibition features over 50 black and white photographic portraits of Albertans who came to Canada following the second World War, re-building their lives and making new homes in Alberta. The exhibition shares their stories of both profound loss and new found life in Canada.
