Message from the Executive Director


2023 was another exciting year at Your AGA. Our exhibition program featured the work of Alberta artists in dialogue with artists from across the country and from around the world. Our exhibitions revolved around a number of themes, including sport and society, dance and the body, collecting as seen through the vision of several visionary Canadian private collectors, and new experimentations with materiality, as seen in the work of contemporary artists engaged with ceramics and textiles.

We began the year with the pairing of two exhibitions that examined sport and its representations, to understand and critique culture. The exhibition *To Play in the Face of Certain Defeat* was both a celebration of diversity and an urgent call to action around issues of racial marginalization created by Canadian artist Esmaa Mohamoud. The artworks in this exhibition included basketballs and basketball jerseys, Victorian-era ballgowns, hockey mesh and reconstructed football equipment, including branded black leather footballs and African wax-printed helmets. In her work, Mohamoud draws on the industry of professional sports, transforming athletic equipment and symbols to illustrate pervasive, discriminatory behaviours and attitudes based on race, class, gender, and sexuality.

In Black and White, an exhibition of the work of Edmonton-born artist Dean Drever, featured a broad selection of Drever's work created solely in black and white. Utilizing images and symbols of power and authority combined with references to sports, primarily as hockey, Drever's work addresses the drive for dominance and control, which impacts society in many ways. In this work, black and white are used to be both positive and negative, foreground and background, reality and myth, right and wrong.

In May, the exhibition *Dance Party* embraced the blending of art, dance and choreography to explore movement as a method of claiming space. Forms of dance are embedded in all cultures as a way to both celebrate and dismantle traditions. The artists featured in *Dance Party* assert themselves in space and enact an embodied celebration of identity. The exhibition acknowledged that if trauma is held in the body, so too are healing and joy.

In 2023, we also explored three different stories of private collecting. The exhibition *Generations: The Sobey Family and Canadian Art* told the story of the Sobey family's visionary engagement with Canadian and Indigenous art. The exhibition *From Warhol to Banksy* featured works of art that defined the Pop Art movement, highlighting the careers of some of the art world's most iconic figures to explore how their irreverent and subversive art practices extended to their materials and methods of production, as they used their artwork as a tool to critique society and consumer culture. This exhibition featured the collection of Paul and Tracy Mitchell. In the fall, *The Collectors' Cosmos:*







The Meakins-McClaran Print Collection provided a glimpse into the making of what became one of the foremost private collections of European prints in Canada. Built over the course of four decades, the core of this collection comprises a wealth of sixteenth- and seventeenth-century Dutch and Flemish prints. I would like to thank the collaborating museum partners, who developed and shared these exhibitions with the AGA: the McMichael Canadian Art Collection, the Kelowna Art Gallery and the National Gallery of Canada, respectively.

Throughout the year we featured solo exhibitions by Alberta artists: Riaz Mehmood, Kenzie Housego, Hanny Al Khoury and Ally McIntyre in the RBC New Works Gallery and Uii Savage in the main hall, with the new installation *Celestial Passage*. In April, our Adjunct Curator of Indigenous Art, Melissa Jo Belcourt Moses, created the new exhibition entitled *kisikayastew Prb>^\text{\sigma}U^\text{\chi}...when the night shines like the day*, focusing on the work of celebrated Indigenous artist Lana Whiskeyjack. Through her paintings, words and images, the artist shared stories of the moon cycles, seasonal change, motherhood and ultimately of creation. We were also proud to present work by Christi Belcourt in the Children's Gallery exhibition \(\div \chi \chi \sigma^{\chi} \cdot\) Wâpakwanîwin (To bloom, it has many flowers).

At the close of 2023, we presented two exhibitions that explored new investigations of material and materiality. The exhibition, *Between Things: Alberta Ceramics* shone a light on the wild, whimsical and endlessly creative work of Alberta ceramic artists, featuring some of the most influential artists working in ceramics in Alberta over the past decade. *Second Skin* featured artists for whom beading and textiles reference the body and how we conceal, reveal, protect, attract, restrain and deflect it. For some of the artists, their work is a connection to the bodies of ancestors past, while for others it is a radical imaging of future selves.

I would like to thank and acknowledge the work of all of the artists in AGA exhibitions as well as the curators, including AGA curators: MJ Belcourt Moses, Lindsey Sharman, Danielle Siemens, as well as guest curator Diana Sherlock. More information on these, and more, exhibitions and artists can be found later in this report.

The AGA is equally proud to continue our long-time commitment to education and learning, as well as to public and community engagement. In 2023, we saw increased engagement with our tri-lingual school program, as well as public programming activities that attracted people of all ages to the



AGA. These programs were diverse and multi-faceted, ranging from children's art classes, new community markets, late-night Refinery parties to our award-winning seniors' programs.

2023 continued to be a challenging year from a financial perspective. Despite this, we were thrilled to achieve record audience attendance this year, as we exceeded many pre-Covid years for gallery admissions. While 2023 was also impacted by the lack of a catering and event provider, at the end of the year we welcomed the Edmonton Convention Centre as our new food service partner. We anticipate many great things to arise from this strategic alliance in the years to come.

I would like to express our sincere thanks to the public funders and ongoing corporate sponsors who continued to support the AGA this year, as well all of our new supporters who joined the AGA family in 2023. The Poole Centre of Design, funded by the Poole Family Foundation through the Edmonton Community Foundation, continued to be a key AGA funder of inspiring programming focussed on the intersection of art and design.

The AGA relies on the goodwill of so many people to operate each year, and we would like to acknowledge the donors who made financial and in-kind contributions to support AGA operations now and in the future. Our most sincere gratitude is given to the many people, AGA Members, Curator's Circle and Director's Circle Members, private donors and AGA Always legacy endowment campaign supporters who gave so generously to the AGA this year. This includes those who donated works of art to help us grow our permanent collection.

I would like to thank all the AGA staff and volunteers for their contributions over the past year. In particular, I would like to recognize the management team: Dara Armsden, Alice Leung, Mike Slywka and Pat St. Arnaud, who work hard every day to ensure the success of the AGA. I would also like to welcome Trina Johnson, who joined the team in July 2023 to oversee the development of our anniversary legacy campaign and ongoing funding support.

I am profoundly grateful to Leon Zupan, Chair of the AGA Board of Directors for his dedicated leadership and tireless commitment to the AGA and building for our future. The AGA Board of Directors and the AGA Always committee continue to provide guidance and support for the AGA team, and their work is most appreciated.

We are all working toward 2024 and the celebration of our 100th Anniversary.



The Travelling Exhibition Program (TREX) was established in 1981 by the Alberta Foundation for the Arts with the vision that every Albertan would have the opportunity to experience visual art exhibitions in their own communities. The TREX program is a coordinated effort between The Alberta Foundation for the Arts (AFA) and the Art Gallery of Grande Prairie, Grande Prairie (TREX Region 1); the Art Gallery of Alberta (AGA), Edmonton (TREX Region 2); The Alberta Society of Artists, Calgary (TREX Region 3); and the Esplanade Arts & Heritage Centre, Medicine Hat (TREX Region 4).

The AGA has managed the TREX program for north central and northeastern Alberta (TREX Region 2) since 1986. In March 2018, the AFA awarded the AGA management of the TREX program for another five years (2018–2023). In December of 2023, the AFA offered the AGA management of the TREX program in north central and northeastern Alberta (TREX Region 2) for the 2024-2025 season.

- Connections to Alberta Education's Programs of Study in the areas of Social Studies, Language Arts, Science, French, Spanish and Early Childhood Learning
- In-depth investigations of featured exhibitions and studio practices
- Heightened focus on inquiry-based learning and student-centered programming



Family Programs

Family programs provide opportunities for families to connect to exhibitions through art explorations focused on play, hands-on art-making and exciting in-gallery experiences.

Stroller Tours are in-depth tours of a current exhibitions offered once per month
to parents with new babies. With added flexibility, caregivers can learn about
art in a safe space where babies can be babies and parents can interact with
other parents.

 Tours for Tots is a weekly art exploration for families with young children to discover exhibitions together. Themes change from week to week, and the program includes a gallery visit, hands-on art experiments, storytelling and more.

Art Classes and Camps

Offered throughout the year, Art Classes and Camps are for children ages 6-12 and youth ages 13-17 to hone their visual literacy, critical thinking and artmaking skills. Each class or camp features close-looking activities and discussion, unique art projects and material explorations.

Weekend Art Classes feature a wealth of opportunities for students to explore
their creativity including investigative gallery visits and process-led art projects
inspired by featured exhibitions. Weekend Art Classes are led by professional
artists/educators and are focused on experimentation, risk-taking and
participation in a dynamic studio setting.

ArtBreak Camps are offered during the spring and summer school breaks.
 Students take the lead in these exploratory programs to discover the world around them through art activities, exercises and projects related to specific themes. Focusing on student interactions and personal experiences, these camps create bridges between art, ideas and the community.

Youth Programs & Initiatives

By engaging with art and ideas featured in current exhibitions, Youth programs provide teens the opportunity to hone their artistic skills and to expand and develop their creative voices.

 Youth Art Classes dive into the creative practices of artists featured in current exhibitions while providing opportunities to take artistic risks in a safe and fun environment.

The AGA Youth Council is a group of dedicated teen volunteers committed
to developing teen audiences at the AGA. As members of the council, youth
have exclusive access to the inner workings of the Gallery, as well as unique

Adult Programs

Adult Open Studio is a casual drop-in art workshop offered weekly. Featuring
a new project and theme connected to current exhibitions each week, these
workshops provide participants with opportunities to experiment and explore
new ideas and materials in a relaxing studio environment.

 Art Express is a hands-on approach to art education for adults with developmental challenges. Class sessions take place in twelve-week intervals throughout the year and involve drawing, printmaking, painting, sculpture and mixed media art. Partnering with the Cerebral Palsy Association of Alberta, Art Express offers class projects that are inspired by current exhibitions and are focused on students expressing their creativity.

Community Outreach

Community Outreach activities foster engagement beyond our regular programming schedule and include partnerships with community organizations and activities off-site and in the community.

 Art Hive is a weekly community-based artmaking initiative that is open to all and welcomes participants as artists. Partnering with the St. Stephen's College Art Therapy program at the University of Alberta, Art Hive is a safe(r) and inclusive space that uses artmaking as a tool for collaboration, dialogue, skill-sharing and community engagement for people across different cultural and socio-economic backgrounds, ages and abilities. No art training or experience is required to participate.

- Beyond the Park Art Contest: The AGA partnered with Laberinto Press to find their next book cover artist. The contest was open to artists ages 4-7. Entries were exhibited in our Education Gallery in April. The winning entry will be featured on the front cover of Laberinto Press' anthology Beyond the Park to be published in 2024.
- Our Family Roots: A month-long art exhibition from March 12 to April 3 in the
 TD Education Gallery in partnership with the Alberta Genealogical Society and
 St. Thomas Aquinas School. Students are invited to investigate their family roots
 and create a poster for display. The exhibition was open to the public, and the
 Education and Learning team hosted a special reception and ceremony as part of
 the outreach initiative.

Enterprise and Visitor Experience

Acting as "the face of the AGA", Enterprise and Visitor Experience creates a warm and welcoming environment for our guests, clients, customers and members. By marrying the attributes of its four programs—Guest Services, Art Sales & Rental, the Community Gallery and shopAGA—Enterprise reaches into Alberta's creative community and helps build sustainable financial opportunities for artists and makers while attracting visitors to Edmonton's downtown.

Guest Services

As the first point of contact for most visitors to the AGA, Guest Services plays an integral role in ensuring visitors enjoy their time at the Gallery. In addition to processing admissions, Guest Services also serves as a hub of information for visitors, clients and artists.

With 2023 being the first pandemic-era year without government-mandated health and safety restrictions and open travel borders, the AGA reported considerable growth in attendance. Overall visitation, including all programming, education and events, increased by over 32% from the previous year and the highest since 2017 with the majority of visitors interacting directly with our Guest Services team. By providing ongoing training to our Guest Services Associates and streamlining daily processes, the increased traffic was managed to ensure the exceptional level of personal service we strive to provide all visitors.

Our Guest Services team is also involved in the Membership process, from enrollment, to visitation and renewal. Over the last year, growth in Memberships was a focus for the AGA and the AGA experienced a significant increase in active members. The Guest Services team are always pleased to be able to connect in person or over the phone with our new and returning members.

Art Sales and Rental

The longest-running program of its kind in Alberta, Art Sales & Rental enables the public to enjoy art in their homes and offices at a reasonable cost. This vital program supports Alberta artists through remuneration for artwork sold and rented. It also provides a high-profile platform through which professional artists can promote their bodies of work both physically and virtually. For the visitor, the Art Sales & Rental Gallery creates an accessible avenue to encounter thousands of artworks in every medium, which in turn builds understanding of and greater appreciation for Alberta art and artists.

In 2023, Art Sales & Rental:

- Represented 164 artists
- Carried over 1,460 artworks available for rent and purchase
- Rented an average of 104 artworks each month by 50 artists to 26 clients
- Sold 70 works to 51 clients

Recognizing the importance of stewarding Alberta's next generation of cultural workers, Art Sales & Rental hosted one field placement student from the Grant McEwan University Arts & Cultural Management Program. In this 280-hour placement our intern gained meaningful learning opportunities and real-world culture-sector work experience that included retail/rental operations and management, art handling, client & visitor relations and basic curatorial practices including art installation.

Community Gallery

A new initiative of the Art Sales & Rental program, the Community Gallery supports local community groups who are interested in curating and producing diverse art exhibitions with the intention of selling their artworks. Through this initiative, the AGA provides a venue for these retail exhibitions and supports their production, installation and promotion. Undertaken in a spirit of collaboration, openness and knowledge sharing, the Community Gallery space features up to five exhibitions per year and is always free to the public with all exhibited artworks available for sale.

In 2023, under the administration of Art Sales & Rental, the Community Gallery showcased four exhibitions: *Mosaics, PUSH, Boreal Barometer: The Art of Observation and Well-Being*, and *Mosaic II*. Combined, these exhibitions featured 286 artworks by 129 Alberta senior-, mid-career and emerging artists.

shopAGA

Attracting visitors to the heart of downtown Edmonton, shopAGA is an integral part of our creative community. Celebrating Alberta's provincial identity through the lens of the maker, shopAGA is committed to featuring well-crafted, original, culturally significant and locally sourced, small-batch, studio-made selections that complement AGA gallery exhibitions.

shopAGA is more than a retail destination. It is an integral part of an artist's diverse, whole-career professional practice. shopAGA's retail and marketing opportunities serve as an important component to an artist's larger career scope by supporting their revenue-generation streams and providing a platform on which to build profile in support of their artistic identity. And with a selection of over 1,000 pieces of art, fine craft and design created by 128 artists, designers and makers, shopAGA ensures underrepresented communities are provided opportunities to sell their works. In 2023, shopAGA vendor representation included:

- 49% new vendors
- 78% Albertan
- 21% Indigenous
- 7% persons of colour
- 7% new citizens
- 62% female-led business
- 2% LGBTQ+
- 9% senior (65+ years)
- 7% Francophone

Each year, shopAGA attracts more artists, designers, makers and writers who seek to be a part of this growing enterprise. As our catalog of creators grow, so do the buying selections for our customers, enhancing the gallery experience and making one's shopping excursion more interesting and culturally diverse.

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
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


Revenues & Expenses
