Ekow Nimako: Building Black Civilizations - Journey of 2,000 Ships

January 18 - April 13

This exhibition shares artist Ekow Nimako's Afrofuturistic reimagining of ancient African kingdoms. Using LEGO® bricks as his medium, Nimako explores the mysterious 14th century sea voyage of a predecessor of Mansa Musa, ruler of the Mali Empire. According to legends, Abu Bakr II was an intrepid explorer. He abdicated his throne and took 2,000 ships on an expedition into the Atlantic, but never returned and was never heard from again. Some accounts suggest the massive fleet reached as far as the Americas, but where they went is still unknown.

Combining architecture, historical accounts and fantastical possibilities, Ekow Nimako transcends the geometric form of LEGO® to recreate the epic voyage. In doing so, he presents an uninterrupted and unco-opted narrative of Black civilizations and imagines liberated futures.

AGA100: Act 3 Words to Worldmaking February 8 - June 1

To celebrate the Art Gallery of Alberta's 100th anniversary, we have created a series of three exhibitions that showcase Alberta art and artists in the AGA's Collection. Many of the works are rooted in conceptions of time: revealing the passage of time or snapshots of time; capturing subtle or dramatic changes over time; or exploring the eternal or ideas of timelessness. Themes of time—including duration, seasons, history, memory, generations, and the future—connect across these anniversary exhibitions.

AGA100: Act 3 Words to Worldmaking focuses on people, communities, history and storytelling. Many of the works employ words and language to explore forms of human communication, while others more broadly examine the ways how we interact with each other, with the land, and with things that are greater than ourselves. These works communicate over time and space.



5 Artists 1 Love February 21-March 30

5 Artists 1 Love is an annual exhibition that celebrates the artistic vibrancy and range of Edmonton's African-Canadian communities, from Angola to Zanzibar, Togo to Tobago, or Brazil to Barbados! This phenomenal art exhibition showcases the diversity of the African diaspora, promotes emerging and established artists, develops global African cultures and celebrates African-Canadian brilliance.

Now celebrating its 19th year, the exhibition once again showcases five African-Canadian artists, highlighting their unique style and vision arising from their global and local experience.

In this final exhibition marking the Art Gallery of Alberta's 100th anniversary, fourteen Alberta artists consider collective and individual futures while reflecting on two interrelated questions: What can we hold onto? And What will we leave behind? This exhibition considers what we need, what we don't, what is possible to maintain and the marks and legacies we leave.

This exhibition was created through an open call. Nearly 200 artists submitted their work for consideration. A jury of Alberta based arts professionals comprised of Mohsen Ahi Andy, Su Ying Strang and Hannah Quimper-Swiderski created a long-list of 30 artists from which this exhibition was curated.

Emily Chu: Preserving Fragments March 29, 2025 - March 15, 2026

This exhibition is a story of immigration on the prairies. Drawing upon her own experience moving to Alberta in the early 1990s, Edmonton-based artist Emily Chu uses illustration to reflect upon her upbringing and the time spent with her grandmother as they each got to know their new home and community. The mural touches upon themes relevant to all diasporic peoples including language, assimilation, grief, cultural erasure and how one's identity is shaped by their surroundings and community.

Knowledge Made Concrete: 100 Years of Teaching and Collecting

January 16 - March 8, Illingworth Kerr Gallery (Calgary)

As Alberta's two oldest cultural institutions, AUArts and the AGA have enjoyed a century-long partnership. In honour of their respective 100th anniversaries, this exhibition draws from the AGA's Permanent Collection, showcasing works by AUArts alumni and faculty. The exhibition also features new works by recent alumni and current instructors, offering a reflection on the past while also looking to the future.

In 1940 J.W.G. Macdonald described "art" as "knowledge made concrete." This also describes art education, where students and instructors transform abstract ideas into forms, and summarizes the connection between art and public collections, like that of the Art Gallery of Alberta (AGA), which preserves works by numerous influential artists associated with the Alberta University of the Arts (AUArts).
